

The Torrance Community Jamboree a The Torrance Community Jamboree a salute to Torrance area service and civic groups, will open Monday noon at the Grand Theater, 1522 Craven St., and continue through Friday.

All segements of Torrance civic life will All segements of Torrance civic life will be represented at the jamboree which will be open daily from 12 noon until 9 p.m. Booths will be located inside the theater, while the larger displays will be located across the street in a parking lot. The jam-boree is free of charge.

Arranged by the Torrance Pacific Tel-ephone Community Relations Team, head-ed by Jim Conn, the jamboree is a first-of-its-kind in the Los Angeles area and is expected to attract thousands of persons throughout the week the week.

rance Jaycees, Torrance Municipal Airport, Torrance Unified School District, Torrance Fire Department, City Library, Red Cross, the city's Recreation Department, and the U.S. Army, Ft. MacArthur. "The jamboree is a consolidated effort to bring the many civic services available to Torrance residents together," Conn said. "I urge every citize to attend the jamboree

"Your Own Thing" is the theme of the Recreation Department's display which will be rotated throughout the week. Craft demonstrations by experts in their respective fields, including ceramics, paint-ing, fencing and guitar playing, are sched-uled. Booth vsitors may also try their hand at oil painting, on a 7-foot community mural. A continuous slide show of the city's recre-ation activities is also planned. Outside the theater, the recreation de-partment has scheduled the Happy Wander-er Theater, a port-a-park display, a mobile nature museum, and a ski demonstration. The City Library will emphasize the technical side of the library at its booth. The display will follow a book from its arrival at the processing center until ready for the library shelves. An artist's rendering of the city's new library also will be on display, A "behind the scenes" look at Torrance Fire Department will include a display of specialized tools and equipment not often seen by the public. A "fire starters" display will show Torrance residential fires. The city's

will show Torrance residents the probable cause of many residential fires. The city's

"Education in Action" is a display by the Torrance Unified School District which will acquant residents with the new look of education. A slide series will show the many phases of education and its application to the local community. Indian lore and crafts will be displayed by the Torrance Family YMCA, Indian Guides and Maidens at the jamboree. Guides and Maidens will be dressed in authentic Indian costumes.

The experimental aircraft "Flutter-bug," a pint-size portable aircraft, will be displayed by Torrance Municipal Airport. Other air-port displays will include an air traffic dis-play, a scale model of the 500-acre airport and industrial services available at the air poet. port.
