The student revolt hasn't spread into northern Mexican states — "the breeding ground of revolutions." If you drive through this route, stop off and see Luz Corral, the widow of Pancho Villa. She has a little Villa muse-um in his old home — pis-tols, cap and sword with the poem carved on the blade.

Four hours south, stop at Hidalgo de Parral where Villa was ambushed. The place where they got him from behind the hay bales is marked with a plaque. And there's a stone with a florid invenity in the level. florid inscription in the local cemetery.

This is an old silver town.

And on Saturday night, there are usually a couple of barroom shootings when the cowboys come to town. Two fair hotels. Food is

passable and hot as a fire-

I don't think so, I would chance it. It is off-season now. And Mexico has enough highway hotels and motels to take care of onseason traffic. I surely wouldn't figure on getting into Mexico City without reservations. Not until the Olympics are over.

If you are stopped in Maxico by a policeman, it IS Mexican custom to ask, "Could I pay the fine to you, Officer?" This is not consid-

"Are Mexican roads well-marked? Or will we need maps?"

You can get a free map by writing Dan Sanborn, Mc Allen, Texas. (Who sells Mexico car insurance which you must have.) He will mark the best route for you on it if you ask. (So be a sport and buy your insur-ance from him.)

The roads are well-marked. Distances in kilometers.
(For miles: km times 6 and
