(Continued from page A-1) undesirable in any residential district due to a greater noise factor and a more pronounced appearance."

Assemblymen Vincent Thomas and L. E. Townsend also made brief presentations but neither confirmed or denied the need for the Torrance freeway or endorsed any of the 13 proposed routes.

However, Thomas sated opposition to breaking up small communities with freeways because small towns are having a hard time financing local government. He said that the city of Lomita has asked him to sub-

mit legislation to keep the freeway outside Lomita city limits.

THOMAS added that he didn't see how the Torrance freeway could be financed within the next 10 years. Cost of the freeway will be roughly \$90 million.

Thomas reminded the audience, assembled at Torrance High School Auditorium, that unless a city comes to an agreement on the freeway, no freeway may be built.

Assemblyman Townsend stated that there should be at least one more state hearing on the freeway so that everyone might be heard. He renewed his promise to introduce legislation against the freeway if adequate hearings were not held in his opinion.

REPRESENTATIVES of the cities of Redondo Beach, Rolling Hills Estates, and Palos Verdes Estates each presented their endorsement of the red route or a variation of the red route.

Chairman T. F. Bagshaw, chairman of the Highway Division board, stated that the official record of the hearings will be open for 30 days and anyone may submit his testimony in writing within that time. Comments should be sent to the State Division of Highways, 120 S. Spring St., Los Angeles.

THE HOSPITAL from almost the beginning has been operating at full capacity. The Laboratory has a training program for medical technologists; the X-Ray department has a training program for X-Ray Technicians; and the nursing program is coordinated with El Camino College, whose students do their clinical training at Little Company of Mary Hospital.

During the next 15 months the following will be accomplished in three phases:

- Phase I — Ground Floor — Emergency Room, X-Ray Department, Nuclear Medicine, Physical Therapy, Cardiac-pulmonary Lab, Central Supply.
- Phase II — New Urological Room, new nurses and doctors lounge. (Surgery).
- Phase III — 1st Floor — Extending Building — enlarge lobby, offices, medical records and gift shop.

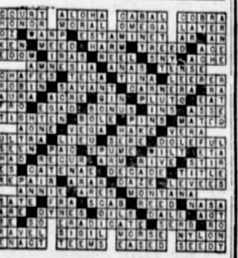
Conference For Nurses Under Way
