

The Election Devices Committee expressed confidence in the IBM Votomatic system in a report to the Board of Supervisors yesterday.

The committee originally was formed by supervisors to advise on new methods of automating the county's vote-tally system, Chace said. The group made a spe-cial study of the IBM sys-tem following last June's primary.

"IN GENERAL, we agree that most of the election problems in the June Primary did not relate directly to the new voting system, said John Lawson, commit-tee chairman. The primary marked the first time the

committee members that the automated system in the primary was a success, since the voters indicated overwhelming approval of it,' Lawson said.

"One change we have suggested is to be sure to have voters inspect their ballots for cleanly punched cards after voting," Lawton said.

"This would be similar to the old paper ballot system when voters were asked to make sure they clearly stamped within appropriate squares."

PROBLEMS encountered in the June test of the system have been attacked so they will not recur next month, according to Chace.

"Every effort has been made to eliminate the problem areas of the automati

"I concur with the Committee that the faults encountered in June were not due to the use of the IBM Votomatic but to changes in the system of collecting and feeding ballots into the computer."
