The committee will conduct full hearings in Los Angeles Oct. 17 and 18 on its proposed \$50 million California Local Recreation Fund legislation. The Mu-seum of Science and Industry, 700 State Drive, Exposi-tion Park, will be the scene of the hearings.

"ALTHOUGH the major demand for outdoor recreation opportunities is in and near the large urban areas, the increasing leisure, mobility and disposable income of our exploding population, in the broader context. clearly makes this a state-wide problem," Townsend said.

(Continued from Page C-1) North Vietnam to reciprocate in good faith to further bombing halts over its terri-tory. Pressure tactics and a show of force, Blatchford says, will do more to expedite negotiations.

These tactics include threatening to mine Hanoi Harbor and training guerrillas to cary the war into North Vietnam. The United States shoud not necessarily do these things, Blatchford explains, but should use them as options at the bargaining table.

THE CANDIDATE also thinks the United States should cut off trade with all nations who support the Viet Cong. He takes a dim view of liberalized relations with

Blatchford believes an other key issue in his campaign is the competency of his opponent, Democrat Glen Anderson. Blatchford reminded voters that Ander-son was lieutenant governor during the Wattes Riots and "could not make a decision" about what to do until the riots had risen to "unbeliev-

able proportions."
"We need men who can
made decisions," Blatchford insisted, pointing out that the McCone Commission re-port on the Watts Riots placed much of the blame for death and destruction on Anderson's indecisiveness.

BLATCHFORD predicts a Republican sweep in 1968. Remembering that Lt. Gov. Bob Finch "slaughtered" Anderson in the 17th District when the two were run-ning for the state's second highest job in 1966, Blatchford believes he'll win han-dily over Anderson in No-

Geing on to receive his degree in political science from UCLA. Blatchford studied law at UC Berkeley, where he was president of his first year law class.

AT UCLA, he was captain of the Varsity Tennis Team. and later played at Wimble don in 1957.

Before entering law school, Blatchford served as administrative assistant to a New York Congressman in

Washington, D.C. Now settled in San Pedro. Blatchford is married to the former Winifred Marich, whom he met while she was an ACCION volunteer. Mrs. Blatchford received her de-gree in Spanish with honors from UCLA and has taught at South High School. She is also fluent in Portuguese and Serbo-Croatian.
