### Citizens' Group Fails in Plea For New Vote

The seven local legislators refused to reverse their stand when representatives of South Bay Citizens for Community Action present-ed two petitions requesting the council to oppose all freeways in Torrance.

The first petition, allegedly bearing 2,400 signatures of Torrance residents, is aimed at the City Council.

The second petition, thought to list 3,000 signatures, is addressed to Gov. Ronald Reagan and local state legislators, asking them to introduce legislation to remove the Torrance freeway from the master plan of freeways.

COMMUNITY Action spokesman, Stephen B. Lew-is. 21317 Marjorie Ave., whose home lies in the path of the red route, told mem-bers of the City Council that they had not acted as true representatives of the people when they endorsed the red-dash-red route. He said 75 per cent of those at-tending the formal council hearing on the freeway op-posed all freeways in Tor-rance.

Councilmen voted 4-2. with Mayor Albert Isen ab-staining, to endorse the red-dash-red route at a hear-
