The Center operates two daily sessions, 7:30 to 10:30 a.m. and 1 to 4 p.m. Senior students are bussed from their regular schools to attend the Center for three hours daily.

Seven programs are offered: secretarial and office, data processing, key punch, major appliance repair, welding, and dental and medical assistants.
