The creation of wholly new and balanced urban centers, Park said, is too much for the private sector alone. He called for cooperation between government and private investors in developing the new cities and redeveloping the old ones.

Park, a native of Seoul, Korea, joined Victor Gruen & Associates in 1961. He has been associated with the firm's full range of design projects, including the regional master plan for Tehran, capital of Iran.

His other activities have included work on major urban revitalization programs for Honolulu, Kansas City, Boulder, Colo., and Fresno, San Bernardino, Redondo Beach, and Huntington Park. He also developed the master plan for Valencia, a new town designed for a population of 250,000 now under construction in the Southland.

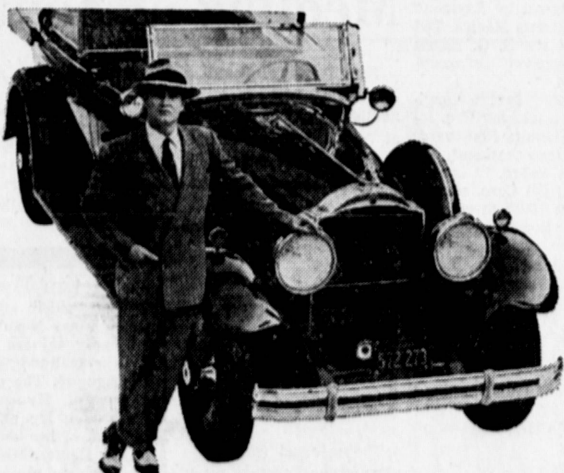

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Goodwill String Ends At 45 Weeks

A truck accident has ended a 45-week safe driving record at Wrightman Memorial Goodwill Industries in Long Beach.

The accident left the

Goodwill truck looking "like a squeezed accordion," according to Thornburn Speicher, but driver Merchant Lawrence escaped with only minor injuries.

Goodwill had completed 45 weeks without a time-loss accident when the crash occurred. Speicher said that represented 361,875 man hours.

"We can still dare plants with 250 non-handicapped people to do as well," Speicher commented.

Goodwill's previous record to no time-loss accidents was 49 weeks.

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
