The creation of wholly new and balanced urban centers, Park said, is too much for the private sector alone. He called for cooperation between government and private investors in de-veloping the new cities and redeveloping the old ones.

Park, a native of Seoul, Korea, joined Victor Gruen & Associates in 1961. He has been associated with the firm's full range of design projects, including the re-gional master plan for Teh-ran, capital of Iran.

His other activities have in cluded work on major urban revitalization programs for Honolulu, Kansas City, Boulder, Colo., and Fresno, San Bernardino, Redard, Paceba and Hunting resno, San Bernardino, Redondo Beach, and Huntington Park.
