

New System For Tie Game

After successful trials on the lower play-off levels for the past several years, the California Tie-Breaker System has been adopted for use in all play-off divisions for the 1968 CIF, SS, football play-offs which move into second-round action on Friday night,

In the event any game other than the championship game in any division ends in a tie, the captains of the two teams will meet and toss a coin to determine which

two teams will meet and toss a coin to determine which team opens play in the California System.

The ball is placed on the 50 yard line, and each team will be given four plays to be run alternately. This means that Team A runs one play, Team B runs one play, Team A runs a play and the teams continue to alternate until each has had four downs. There are no kicks of any type permitted, and if a score is not made, the team to advance in the play-offs will be determined by the side of the 50 yard line that the ball winds up on after the eighth down.

After any score, the ball is returned to the 50 yard

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In a first-round "A" division game, the system was used quite successfully as St. Bonaventure managed to move the ball to Harvard's 48 yard line to gain a second-round berth after a 13-13 deadlock.

Lee Hanson, coach of the Harvard Saracens, commented that he was not at all displeased with the system, and Dave Currey, coach of the winning St. Bonaventure squad, said, "It was like a tug-of-war. Both stands stood throughout the eight downs, and we had to gain 13 yards on the last play to gain the victory."
