North Takes Lead In Bay Basketball

After three games North High is all alone atop the Bay League basketball standings. The Saxons knocked off Hawthorne Wednesday, 74-68, and will take a 3-0 record to Mira Costa tonight.

West High invades South with a 2-1 record after beating Santa Monica, 78-71. Bill Kolodziejczak and Tom Sandowich both scored 29 points in the victory.

South was upset for a second time while bowing to Redondo, 60-51. A four-point first quarter handcuffed the Spartans throughout the game. They never recovered.

Hawthorne, Redondo, and Santa Monica are in second place with 2-1 records. South, West, and Inglewood are 1-2 while Sahomi is winless in three starts.

Harlen Peet scored 20 points in North's 6-point win over Hawthorne. The Saxons started out with a 19-12 first quarter lead, but Hawthorne got within 31-30 at halftime.

North's four-man scoring team of Peet (20 points), Dan Anderson (18), Jim Thomas (17), and Bob Frasquillo (13) offset the Cougar's high scoring effort of Paul Crowell (24) and Don Adams (22 points).

Mira Costa, host to North tonight, has beaten Inglewood and Santa Monica since losing an opening game to Redondo.

Redondo travels to Inglewood and Santa Monica invades Hawthorne in tonight's pairings.

Fishing License

Complaints are heard every once in awhile about the cost of licenses for hunting and fishing in California. Some of these are legitimate and some are not. A look at what is accomplished during the year through these resources might end some of the speculation.

Consider, for instance, that the Department of Fish and Game produced, in its hatcheries, some 39,248,896 fish weighing a record 2,705,759 pounds during 1968. Trout was the dominant fish, along with kokanee, with 25,384,547 produced, followed by 13,604,310 salmon and steelhead, and 260,129 warm-water fish.

In the aerial planting program, about 6 million fingerling trout were dropped into more than 900 back-country lakes, with the cost of planting these lakes reduced from \$18.75 per thousand fish to \$1.43 per thousand.

The American River Fish Hatchery near Sacramento, costing \$1 million, will produce 5 million fingerling, 500,000 subcatchable, and 1 million catchable sized trout annually. It was dedicated in 1968. Other hatchery projects included the modernization and enlargement of the Fillmore Hatchery in Ventura County, the reconstruction of the Kern River Hatchery, destroyed by flood waters in 1966, completion of testing for a warmwater hatchery in the Imperial Valley, and authorization for the production of 500,000 one-half pound channel catfish annually; and the construction of the Mad River Salmon and Steelhead Hatchery.

The Steelhead installation will be completed this year and will produce one million yearling and 5 million fingerling salmon and steelhead for stocking in streams along the north coast.

Wardens for the DFG made 16,105 arrests for violations of fish and game laws, representing an increase of two per cent. Fines by the courts totaled \$479,563.

There were 10 wardens added during the year, the first since 1956, even though hunting and fishing activity has grown tremendously in that period of time.

In the wildlife management section, deer tag returns for 1968 were 29 per cent higher than 1967.

Checks by DFG personnel show that 40 per cent of the deer kill were not turned in by the hunters in the second year of the "self validation" program.

Some 32 special deer hunts with 11,240 permits were authorized during the year. Special antelope hunts were held with 189 buck antelope being taken. The department also checks on bighorn sheep, Tule elk, and has instituted a study in an effort to curtail the high road kill of deer of 8,517 during the year.

Good hunting was noted for quail, chukars, and rabbits while the pheasant production and hunter success was down. The first turkey hunt was held and the planting of 4,334 exotic birds was accomplished. The 1,320,000 goose count was a new high, and hunter success for waterfowl was up 25 per cent.

Navy Football Coach

Rick Forzano, who never played a minute of college football, was chosen by Navy as the man to lead it out of gridiron doldrums.

Forzano, 40, offensive backfield coach for the Cincinnati Bengals of the American Football League, replaces Bill Elias as head football coach. Elias was dropped Dec. 11 after his 1968 team lost eight of 10 games and bowed to Army 21-44.

Forzano who was an assistant coach at Navy from 1959 to 1964 when he became coach at the University of Connecticut, never played at Kent State University from which he was graduated. However he became a backfield coach there and went on into a coaching career.

During his previous stint at the Academy, Forzano was credited with bringing Roger Stauback, the 1963 Heisman trophy winner to Annapolis.

"Our records reflect that he's been one of our most effective athletic recruiters in the past 15 years," a spokesman said.

Forzano went to two bowl games with the Middies, handling the offensive and defensive backs in the 1961 Orange Bowl and the 1964 Cotton Bowl.

Field Set For Stock Car Race

Eight bright-eyed drivers, who compose Ford's million dollar stock car racing team and one very sleepy-eyed independent racer fretted at Riverside as their cars were put through tech inspection for Sunday's Motor Trend 500.

Five-time winner Dan Gurney, '67 winner Parnelli Jones, all-time NASCAR season money winner (\$136,000) Cale Yarborough, all-time NASCAR race winner (92 victories) Richard Petty, NASCAR champion David Pearson, two-time national driving champion Marion Andretti, three-time Indy 500 winner A. J. Foyt, and super speedway charger, Lee Roy Yarborough, all seem relaxed.

They were not nearly as relaxed as independent James Hylton, a former Grand National division rookie-of-the-year, who will be driving a '67 Dodge Charger in the race at 11 a.m. Sunday.

Generally a tense, and sometimes amusing, pre-race period, tech inspection is a period when all the Grand National entries (late models, '67-'68) are inspected for any hop-up modifications deviating from the stock car regulations.

The 33-year-old Hylton carefully conserved his bankroll during the first two races of the new season in order to rent the Riverside track for pre-race practice — just like the factory team prior to the Motor Trend event.

He arrived bleary-lidded from a non-stop, cross-country drive Tuesday morning and made arrangements to pay for the use of the track prior to the race, in the only time slot available — at night.

A new trophy and its accompanying prize money raised the purse for Sunday's race to more than \$100,000.

Falstaff created a special four-foot tall trophy, called the "Falstaff Cup" which, with \$2,500 in prize money, will go to the winner of the 500-mile stock car race.

Broadway Joe Namath, who talked and passed his New York Jets to the world's football championship over the Baltimore Colts, will make his debut in the third annual Astrojets Golf Classic Feb. 14-16.

Namath, his teammate Bill Mathis, and three other pro athletes who make their living throwing for New York teams will play in the 54-hole tourney at the La Costa Country Club course located between Los Angeles and San Diego.

Fran Tarkenton, quarterback of the N.Y. Giants, and young pitchers Tom Seaver and Jerry Koosman of the Mets will also be making their debut in the popular and suddenly nationally prominent Astrojet Classic.

Quarterback Namath, most valuable player in the AFL and the Super Bowl, can not only talk a good game but can also shoot one in golf — frequently in the 70s.

The loquacious Namath should have quite a debating duel of the course with another forensic performer, Detroit Tiger star pitcher Denny McLain.

McLain, first player signed for the Astrojet Classic, won the American League's most valuable player award and Cy Young Award for winning 31 games, the most in one season since Lefty Grove won 31 in 1931.

Should Seaver need golf lessons, he can get expert advice right at home. The former USC pitcher's father is Charley Seaver, one-time Stanford University golf star and former California State Amateur champion.

Carpenter, a junior from Torrance High School, was the nation's No. 3 free throw shooter last year.

Bill Stricker (6-8, 210) gives the Tigers added strength on the boards, while sophomores Bobbie Sperring and Vic Crawford also have seen some playing duty.

Edwards' Tigers won back-to-back WCAC championships in 1966 and 1967 with Keith Swagerty (now with the ABA Houston Mavericks).

Pepperdine, because of its lack of size on the front line, has struggled to a 4-7 overall record and 0-3 in the WCAC.

Star guard Bobby Sands continues to pace the Waves attack with a 19.0 average for the three conference games.

Despite being suspended for three games earlier, forward Tom Egerer has had the hot shooting hand lately. He's averaging 16.7 points per game in hitting 53 per cent of his shots from the floor.
