## Contract for Drain Awarded

A \$1,255,927 contract for construction of a storm drain complex in the west Compton, east Gardena area has been awarded by County supervisors.

Included in the project will be work involving sections of Avalon, Compton, Redondo Beach, Alondra, and Gardena boulevards; Parmelee and Rosecrans avenues; Main and Figueroa streets; and Broadway.

The contract was awarded to Kruse Construction Co.

## Film for Schools Scheduled

Torrance Unified School District will be the locale of an educational movie to be produced this spring, according to Dr. J. H. Hull, superintendent of schools.

Featuring the kindergarten reading program, the 16 millimeter training film will be produced for nationwide distribution by the Southwest Regional Laboratory for Educational Research and Development.

For the past two years, Torrance has been participating in a pilot program on reading in kindergarten, utilizing materials developed by the regional laboratory — a government-financed agency set up to research new materials and teaching techniques.

LAST YEAR, materials — including oral language development procedures, read-and-listen books, reading books, and specific lessons on reading skills — were used in conjunction with recommended teaching techniques at Arlington Elementary School.

This year, the pilot program spread to Calle Mayor, Carr, Edison, Riviera, Fern-Greenwood, Waltheria, and Madrona Elementary Schools.

Before being tried out in Torrance, the materials underwent several revisions in Nevada, Arizona, and elsewhere in California.

It is anticipated that the film will be available for distribution in late spring.

## Teenager Shot by Deputy

A 16-year-old boy was shot Friday afternoon and two other persons were charged with assaulting a police officer during an altercation in the Clifton Heights area between Torrance and Redondo Beach.

The would-be youth was identified as Michael Gene Roberts, of 1013 Avenue D. He was treated at South Bay District Hospital for a bullet wound in the left shoulder, pending transfer to the USC-County Medical Center jail ward.

Deputy Michael Currin fired at YOUNG Roberts after the youth pulled a .32-caliber revolver on Currin, investigating officers reported.

Currin had gone to the residence in response to a call about a disturbance and, officers said, had been physically assaulted by the youth's mother, Mrs. Sharon Roberts, 43, and an uncle, Joe Faulkner, 46.

Both Faulkner and Mrs. Roberts were arrested and booked on charges of assaulting a police officer. Young Roberts will be charged with assault with a deadly weapon, it was reported.

## Recruiting Policemen Easy Here

While police departments in other cities struggle to keep their ranks filled, the Torrance Police Department boasts an outstanding recruitment record.

At present, there is only one opening on the force and several candidates for the spot are being considered.

Lieutenant Darrell Lanham, personnel division, says recruitment is "no problem at all" in

Torrance. "We haven't experienced the same problems other cities have in the last year or year and a half," Lanham reports. And a low turnover rate also points to the health of the department.

Lanham attributes the strength of the force to the good working conditions, high pay, and fringe benefits offered to Torrance policemen. The size of

and character of the city is another factor. Careful screening of each prospective police officer also helps assure a low turnover rate, Lanham added.

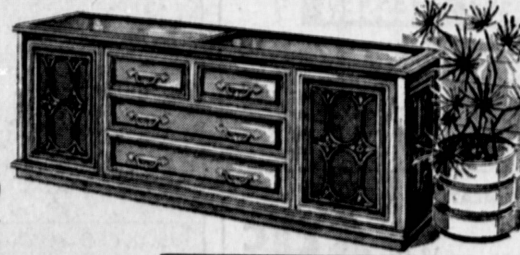
