This column was and is intended to bring up to date, news and information on outdoor activity. It does not make a very interesting story on how Bill Smith or John Jones shoveled mud out of his living room or bailed water out of his kitchen. So to supplement for outdoor reports, we will try to relay a little "under the counter" information and finer points on various ways to fill your creel, when the chance comes.

There are many ardent fishermen who walk the streams, fish from the bank at one of the lakes, or spends all day trolling or still fishing from a boat, who don't really know whether he is going about it right or wrong. It's true, some one will come up with a picture taking size fish every now and then, and claim the only way to catch them is by his method. Ninety-nine times out of a hundred, he won't remember what really happened.


We will take for example, a true experience by one of our local addicts. Mott Houdashelt, a real died-in-the-wool troller, was telling me the only way to catch rainbow trout at Lake Irvine was to troll a small lure, called a "Rebel." And this Rebel had to be black with a little red stripe painted on the under side. So what happens, Mott and his buddy ventured to Irvine one day last week and proceeded to take a limit of trout, from 14 to 19 inches. These are exceptionally nice fish, the only thing is he hooked them on a lure called a "Super Duper," and not only that it was gold in color.

This all boils down to one fact. You have to experiment with a number of lures, and if trolling, try a variety of depths. One day they will hit one color and the next day another. Under normal conditions, use a bright lure when the sun is shining and a darker type on an overcast day.

For the anchor fisherman, when fishing for trout, go prepared with a couple different colored salmon eggs, a can of red worms, and most important of all, a chunk of cheese. Velveeta seems to work the best, as it has a way of staying on the hook much better. There is also on the market, a floating type cheese. This is an excellent bait when the bottom of the lake has snags and fine moss. Also a big help will come from the landing operators. They will give you the best info, because they want you to catch fish as much as you want to take home a limit.

LATE FLASHES: A dozen or so members fished Rock Cod Sunday and came up with some 200 pounds of fillets to be used at our Fish Fry in the near future.

There are a few scattered Surf Perch up to three pounds between Redondo and Hermosa. Big Paper Shell Sandcrabs are the best bait for these beaches. Use one


