Skip Van Leeuwen of Holly-wood will attempt to become the first four-time winner of J. C. Agajanian's annual 100-lap Mo-torcycle T.T. Grand Prix race at Ascot Park. He faces a 100-rider field in the night runping of the field in the ninth running of the spring classic next Sunday after-

Fresh from winning the 20-lap National T.T. racing champion-ship at the world-famous Astro-dome in Houston two weeks ago,

dome in Houston two weeks ago, Van Leeuwen is currently lead-ing the national AMA point race. Ony four riders have won the 100-lap T.T. at the Ascot race-way in the eight previous races. Van Leeuwen and Dick Dorres-teyn of San Pablo have each taken the sweepstakes three times. Eddie Mulder of Burbank and retired Clark White of Bakand retired Clark White of Bak-ersfield have single Triumphs in the longest motorcycle dirt track

T.T. race in the nation.

The fastest 33 qualifiers of the day will start the 100-lap feature expert and amateur class

riders.
Van Leeuwen will face his toughest competition from Dusty Coppage of Burbank, the only rider to beat him at Ascot in the last year and a half. Coppage won the season opener in January, then finished second to "The Flying Dutchman" in the February race.

Other top rated riders expected to compete are Mert Lawwill of San Francisco, winner of last fall's eight-mile National at Asfall's eight-mile National at Ascot; Dan Haaby of Sacramento, the 1967 eight-mile champion at Ascot; Mark Breisford of San Bruno, currently the hottest first year expert rider in the nation; Gene Romero of San Luis Obispo; Jack Simmons of Lakewood; Cal Rayborn of San Diego; Bob Bailey of Carson; Eddie Wirth of Manhattan Beach; Butch Landguth of San Bernardino; Dallas Baker of Orange, and Jim Berry of Costa Mesa.

Amateur stars are Dave Aldana of Santa Ana and Keith Mashburn of Santa Susana.

CLIMBS IN PREP PLAY

Following the trend set in past years, attendance at high school football games throughout Southern California soared during the 1968 season, according to figures released from the CIF office.

The survey, conducted by commissioner of Athletics Ken Fagans, showed an increase of more than 100,000 fans over the 1967 figure, despite competition from two ma-jor universities and one pro-fessional football team.

"The 1968 attendance survey "The 1988 attendance survey did not reflect as great an increase in spectator attendance as did the 1967 survey," Fagans noted, "but this could be attributed to several factors.

"We had much more in-clement weather in 1968, and our play-offs did not draw as well as the 1967 games did," Fagans continued. "In view of all factors, we were quite pleased to show an increase of more than 100,000 over the 1967 figure."

According to the annual sur-According to the annual survey, 3,637,485 fans saw football games played by CIF, Southern Section member schools during the 1968 grid campaign. Of this figure, 275,19 were play-off game spectators, and 3,362,296 were in attendance at a regular season. tendance at regular-season
