Need Men to Fill Lifeguard Positions

Swimming pool lifeguards are wanted for summer positions with the County Department of Parks and Recreation. Supervisor Burton W. Chace announced today.

Applications for pool lifeguard recurrent positions will be accepted until an adequate number of eligible men, age 17 to 39, are examined.

Appointments for taking a qualifying 400-meter swim test may be obtained by calling the

County Parks and Recreation Swimming Pools Division at 749-6911, Ext. 571.

Pool lifeguards earn from \$2.46 to \$3.05 an hour while providing safety and recreation for swimmers, the supervisor said.

Minimum requirements for candidates include: Red Cross Senior Lifesaving Certificate and Red Cross First Aid Certificate or their equivalents. Uncorrected 20/30 vision in each eye is required.

Patrol Teams Continue Auto Inspection Program

Approximately 5,000 passenger vehicles, including panel and pickup trucks, are checked in California Highway Patrol Passenger Vehicle Inspection lanes in the area served by the South Los Angeles office of the Patrol each month, Capt. W. R. Waldron announced this week.

Approximately 77 per cent of these vehicles are found to have one or more violations.

The safety inspection is thorough, yet it moves swiftly; it takes only 3 1/2 to five minutes, on the average, to go through the PVI lane, Captain Waldron said.

AS ONE traffic officer checks the driver's license and vehicle registration, others are checking lights, mirrors, glass, wipers, tires, wheels and suspension.

Together they check horn, turn signals, brakes and steering.

In addition to safety equipment, air pollution control devices are inspected to be sure they have not been removed and that they are connected properly.

If no violations are found, a sticker indicating compliance with safety requirements is attached to the windshield. In only extreme cases are citations issued. For other violations, warnings are given and drivers must make corrections within a specified time.

PASSENGER vehicle inspection programs are required by federal Highway Safety Standards.

Most common violation, statewide, is defective or improperly adjusted lights. Such violations comprise about 70 per cent of the total. Defective wiper blades, leaky exhaust, defective tires and having less than two mirrors are violations found on

thousands of automobiles each month.

Brake, steering and suspension defects are not as prevalent as those listed above, but such defects are found often and can contribute to serious accidents, he said.

The CHP Commander pointed out that most of these are things which the observant vehicle owner could detect himself if he would adopt the practice of giving his car a circle check for safety often.

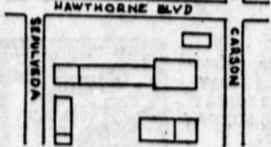
