
Goose Girl

Proponents of Jai Alai, the popular Mexican handball game south of the border, once again seek to bring the sport, along with pari-mutuel wagering, to California

Assemblyman John P. Quim-Assemblyman John P. Qumby (D.Rialto), introduced AB 748, almost a duplicate of his measure of two years ago, withdrawn because other revenue measures were considered at the time.

Quimby said he is re-in-troducing the bill because of the urgent need for additional revenues this year.

Besides the entertaining fea-Besides the entertaining features of the sport, California could realize a new sourse of revenue amounting to about \$4 million the first year of operation. He pointed out that in Florida, where the game is legal, some \$14 million in revenue to the state from the parimutuel machines resulted in four years of operation. years of operation.

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Grunion Run Due **Tonight**

A four-night spawning run of grunion is reported along South-ern California beaches. It is the first run of the 1969 open season on the silvery little oc

Spawning runs of one to two hours are expected to start tonight about 11:06 p.m.; 11:42 Saturday, and 12:36 a.m. Sun-day night.

Additional open-season runs of four-night duration are expected to start March 20, June 16, July

1 and August 1.

The grunion season is closed throughout April and May to allow the fish to spawn unmo-

lested.

Anyone 16 or older must have a valid angling license to take grunion, and they may be taken only by hand. No appliance of any kind may be used and it is unlawful to dig a hole in the beach to entrap the fish. There is no bag limit on grunion, but it is inlawful to waste them.

The Department of Fish and Game says it is impossible to

Game says it is impossible to predict which beaches the fish will hit, but grunion runs may occur on any sandy beach from Mexico north into Santa Bar-

Mexico north into Santa Bar-bara County.
Grunion deposit their eggs about two inches deep in the beach sand. Succeeding tides bury the eggs eight to 16 inches deep. After about 10 days, the next high tides erode the beach and expose the eggs. Within two or three minutes the baby gruand expose the eggs. Within two or three minutes the baby gru-nion hatch and are washed out
