1 box, Savannah cockies,	1 cup powdered sugar
rolled	1½ squares chocolate
$\frac{1}{2}$ c. chopped nuts	3 eggs, separated

1 cup heavy cream	
	1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/4 cup sugar	dash of salt

1/2 cup instant sweet cocoa 12 Scot-Teas

Whip cream, cocoa mix (or cocoa and sugar), salt and vanilla until thick. Spread some of the mixture on each cookie. Place them together in a stack or roll. Put on platter or in refrigerator dish. Frost outside of stack or roll with remaining chocolate cream. Leave in refrigerator eight hours or overnight. Cut in diagonal slices about 1 inch thick.
