

2. Now is a good time to plant Hydrangeas in a shady spot. Nurseries have a wide selection of colors to choose from.

3. Be methodical about pest control. Check your garden plants from time to time. Don't wait until damage is evident.

4. Feed Roses this month and every month through September with a plant food recommended by your nurseryman. It will promote sturdy growth and profuse bloom.

5. Division and re-plant overcrowded Bearded Iris.
