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Women Voters Give Support to AB 409

Mrs. Louis Lanzer, president of the League of Women Voters of Torrance, has announced League support of AB 409, a \$372 million state financial support measure for local schools now pending in the Legislature.

"The League of Women Voters of California has worked for many years for measures which would assure adequate financial support for a public elementary and secondary education system of high standards for all children in California," Mrs. Lanzer said.

"We believe AB 409 would provide state guarantees of a much more realistic level than is currently the case. It will provide a much fairer sharing of the costs of public education between the state and local districts. Increased state aid will also work to equalize the local property tax burden which varies so much from district to district."

"In addition to adequate support for all public schools, league members support the concept of special programs for districts with concentrations of disadvantaged and underachieving pupils."

"Remedial and compensatory programs require more funds than are currently available from the federal government and the local tax base. Therefore, we are pleased at the inclusion in AB 409 of special funds for these programs."

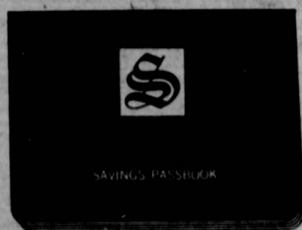
Local support of the measure, which would bring \$1,600,000 in additional state support to Torrance schools, has come from the Torrance Council, PTA; the Torrance board of education; and civic-minded individuals who have been writing to their legislators urging support of the measure.

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
