# Pfeil Is 'Golfer of Year'

Palos Verdes' Mark Pfeil, who turned back a star-studded field of prep golfers with a two-under-par 69 at the Montecito Country Club in Santa Barbara to win the 1969 CIF Individual Golf Championship, has been named CIF Golfer-of-the-Year, it was announced.

Pfeil heads a 12-man aggregation of preps named by the Helms Athletic Foundation. All boys honored will receive cer-

tificates from W. R. "Bill" Schroeder, managing director of the Helms Athletic Foundation.

The naming of Pfeil as golfer-of-the-year marks the fourth year in a row that an underclassman has won the coveted award. Pfeil will be returning in 1970 for his senior season at Palos Verdes.

Joining the Sea King ace on the first team were John Bit-

ting of Huntington Beach, Jerry Shreeves of Paso Robles, Steve Hayes of Huntington Beach, Russ Morrison of Santa Barbara and Gary Singer of Fullerton.

Pfeil set a blistering pace in the CIF, SS, Individual Tournament, firing a phenomenal 32 on the first nine at Montecito, including four birdies. Following the round, the junior ace commented that he

had only two putts outside of 10 feet, and he was hitting his woods better than he had all season.

His 32-37-equal-69 topped second-place finisher Biting by four strokes, with Shreeves in third, Hayes in fourth and Morrison finishing fifth in the tourney June 2 at Montecito.

Palos Verdes coach Bob Wilton, commenting on Pfeil's award, said, "Mark is a truly outstanding golfer. As a fresh-

man, he was the number-one man on our squad, which finished eighth in the CIF team tournament. That season, Mark was named MVP, which is quite an achievement for a freshman."

He joins such illustrious golfers as Billy Casper, Dave Stockton, Tommy Jacobs, Jerry Steelsmith, Bud Holscher and Mac Hunter as a winner of the IF, SS, individual tournament.

## Camino Athletes Honored

Awards for the top athlete, most outstanding individual performance by a team member and most outstanding individual performance have been announced by the El Camino College athletic department.

Wrestler Dan Felix, El Camino College's athlete-of-the-year, won both the Southern California and California state heavyweight championships.

The state title was a repeat for him since he was California J.C. heavyweight champ in 1968. Felix was also voted 1968-69 team captain and most valuable wrestler by the Warrior squad.

A winner of two individual tournaments, Felix has been named co-wrestler of the year by the Southern California Wrestling Coaches and Officials Association along with Ron Kenworthy.

Tom Reynolds, J. C. All-American in football, was cited for "outstanding individual performance by a team member" for his play in a football game against Pasadena City College when he played the entire game with a fractured leg. Reynolds, 1967-68 athlete-of-the-year, is now attending San Diego State College.

Breaststroke champ Dave Mayekawa was singled out for the "outstanding individual performance" award. State 220-yard breaststroke champion, Mayekawa was undefeated in Metropolitan Conference action and undefeated in the Southern California junior college championships in the 100 and 200-yard breaststroke.

## SPORTS CAR RALLYE SET FOR BLIND

A cross country navigational rallye from Los Angeles to Huntington Beach, via Redondo Beach, is scheduled for next Saturday. This is the ninth rallye of its kind, sponsored by the Braille Institute and California Sports Car Club. The cross-country run is expected to reach Portofino Inn, Redondo Beach, for a luncheon break.

The blind navigators read instructions to the drivers in Braille, as they travel the four and a half hour course. Teams arrive at "check points" along the way and final winners are first arrivals with the least amount of time error.

Bob Challman, Manhattan Beach auto dealer, is this year's rallye chairman. Rallye Master is Karp Kapp.

The final stop at Huntington Beach will be at the Huntington Harbor Beach Club where drivers and navigators will hold their rallye, followed by dinner and awarding of prizes to winning navigators.

## Slo-Pitch Games Go Extra Innings

Torrance Wild Mustangs had to play 11 innings in the nitecap of a doubleheader to beat El Segundo Hughes Hustlers twice in a West Coast Slo-Pitch League. The scores were 13-2 and 3-2 Friday night at Torrance Park.

The double win moved the Wild Mustangs into a tie for first place with Bo Polica's Lomita Old Pros, the Upland Bombers, and Hawthorne with records of 3-1 early in the second round of league play. The Mustangs won the first round with 11 wins and two losses.

Chuck Schoendienst pitched the first game for the Wild Mustangs, allowing four hits. The Mustangs collected 12 hits including a homerun by outfielder Terry Tierney. Cal Eubanks limited El Segundo to only four hits in the 11-inning second game while his teammates were getting 13 hits. In that game, Steve Giacomi homered for the Wild Mustangs, and first baseman Roberts homered for El Segundo.

The Torrance Tappa Keggas lost two close games to the Los Angeles Oldtimers, league champs, at McManus Park by scores of 1-0 and 3-2. In the second game, with the score tied 2-2 in the bottom of the seventh inning and a runner on second base, Los Angeles outfielder Silas hit a long ball that stuck up in a tree which overhangs the left field foul line. After 15 minutes of deliberation, the ball was declared "tree lodged" in fair territory; and Los Angeles was awarded a double which scored the winning run from second base.

In other games, the Upland Bombers took two from Redondo Beach by scores of 11-1 and 8-7, the last game going 11 innings. Lomita and Hawthorne split.

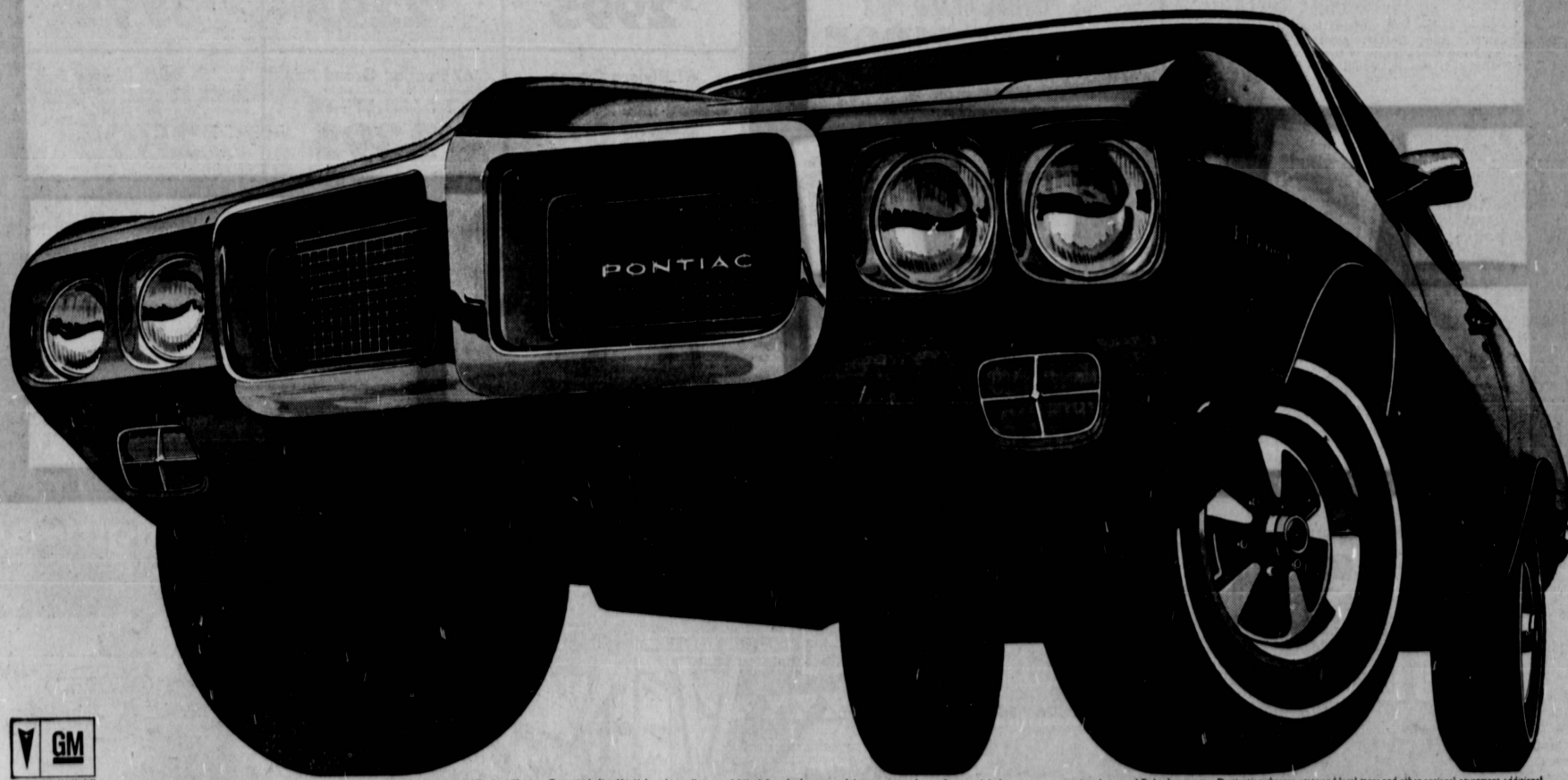
