

Supervisor Kenneth Hahn has sharply criticized Pacific and General Telephone Com-panies for poor maintnance of the freeway emergency telephone system.

The board of supervisors, at Hahn's request, ordered a comprehensive study and re-port to be made on "this serious condition."

"I WAS VERY disturbed to eccive information from the alifornia Highway Patrol hich indicates emergency "I WAS VERY disturbed to receive information from the California Highway P at r o l w hich indicates emergency telephones are not being prop-erly serviced and that the tele-phone companies are neglect-in g the maintenance pro-gram," Hahn said.

G. R. Reinjohn, supervising inspector of zone V of the Cali-fornia Highway Patrol, told Hahn the CHP conducted an extensive survey during April and May.

"THE LARGE number of inoperative or improperly functioning telephones, as well as

the deteriorating quality of the telephone equipment, idicates a need for a comprehensive preventative maintenance pro-gram by the telephone com-panies," Supervising Inspector Reinjohn said.

"EIGHT THOUSAND per-sons per month, or 96,000 per year, presently are being helped by the call boxes," Hahn said.

"I wonder how many others have sought help from the emergency phones and have not received it because of the poor maintenance."




