## **Boaters Warned To Obey Rules**

The Commander of the local Coast Guard District issued a warning today to all boaters navigating waters under his jurisdiction and issued a special word of caution to those on the Colorado River between Parker Dam and Headgate Dam that boarding officers will issue violation citations for reckless and negligent oper-ation of boats.

Rear Adm. Charles Tighe, commander of the 11th Coast Guard District headquartered in Long Beach, urged all boa-ters to use a little common sense in the operation of their small boats and warned them of the hazards of operating while under the influence of in-toxicants. He stated that stiff penalties will be assessed. penalties will be assessed against persons found to be op-erating their boats in a reck-less and or negligent manner.

Admiral Tighe issued this warning because of the general disregard for safety witnessed by Coast Guard safety patrols over the Memorial Day week-

LIEUT. COM. Peter Ster-bling, chiet of the Boating Safety Branch, said, "Coast Guard patrols stopped 190 boa-ters on the Colorado River who were operating their craft in an unsafe, reckless or negli-gent manner over the three day weekend." Of those, 102 received violation citations and 11 warnings were issued just in the Parker area alone. Pe-nalties assessed to these boa-ters, operating reckless or neg ters, operating reckless or neg-ligently, ranged from \$25 to \$100. Lt. Commander Sterbling added, "there were between 20 to 25 accidents and at least eight persons received serious injuries, fortunately there were no fatalities."

Admiral Tighe asked the governors of California and Arizona for their assistance concerning the violent conduct of boaters on the Colorado Riv-er in a recent telegram that said, "During the Memorial Day weekend Coast Guard Boating Safety Patrol on the Colorado River between Park-er Dam and Headgate Dam ob-served shockingly hazardous conditions created by high speed craft and water sking in congested areas and in close served shockingly hazardous conditions created by high speed craft and water skiing in congested areas and in close proximity of swimmers. Ex-cessive use of intoxicants by operators was widely apparent and hazardous operations pre-valled both during daylight and darkness.

"NUMEROUS collisions in-"NUMEROUS collisions in-volving injury to property and persons were observed. One hundred and two citations for unsafe, reckless or negligent navigation were issued by the Coast Guard. Urgency of need for increased law enforcement cannot be overstressed. cannot be overstressed.

"Your immediate assistance and support to curb this violent conduct and protect the public interest is solicited."
