The 6-foot and 150-pound senior from Torrance lowered his own school record in the 3,000-meter steeplechase to 8:49.7 at the 48th annual NCAA Track and Field Championships last week at the University of Tennessee.

A new face in the winner's circle at Gardena's Ascot Park, John Kellar of Yucaipa, will try for his second straight main event win in this Saturday night's sprint car racing program at the raceway.

Kellar notched his first CRA win in last Saturday night's 30-lap main event, driving his own Chevy V8-powered car to the victory.

In winning, he turned back the challenges of veteran drivers Dick Fries and San Diego and Bob Hogle of Buen Park, who finished second and third in the Indianapolis-type car feature.

Fries will be after his first CRA feature win of the year in his Chevy V8 powered car. Hogle goes after his fourth CRA victory of the season af Ascot where he won the 1963 and 68 driving championship.

Baseball Won by Arizona

The Arizona State College Sun Devils won the national collegiate baseball champion-ship for the third time in the last five years.

One of the leading hitters on the team was Jeff Osborn, the outstanding first baseman from North High School.

Osborn, a sophomore at Arizona, posted a .264 batting averge during the College World Series. During a 67-game schedule for Arizona, Jeff has a batting average of .284, accounting for 54 hits and 29 runs betted in Ne scored 31 runs.

The Sun Devils became only the fourth team in the history of the World Series to lose the first game and come back to win the title.

The 56 games won by Arizona during the season is an NCAA record.

Vanity On Tap At Track

Gamely and Amerigo Lady, queens of the American turf for the past two years, will clash for the first time in 1969 Saturday when they will head an outstanding field of distaff runners in the \$75,000 added Vanity Handicap at Hollywood Park.

The mile and one-eighth Van-The mile and one-eighth Van-ity traditionally settles the old-er filly and mare champion-ship of the Hollypark meet and Saturday's 28th running will provide Gamely with an oppor-tunity for a second straight triumph.

Willia m Haggin Perry's equine amazon carried a California record 131 pounds to victory in the '68 Vanity, one of six stakes notched last year by the nation's top-ranked older mare. Saturday she will be spotting Amerigo Lady three pounds, 128-125.

Although she has won a pair of stakes already this year, Gamely's best effort undoubtedly was her runner-up finish to Nodouble in the \$145,000 Santa Anita Handicap.

Gamely, who bested Amerigo Lady in four of five meetings last year, first raced against the Rokeby Stable color bearer at the 1967 Hollypark meeting. Their series of five battles reached a climax in the title-deciding Hollywood Oaks and Amerigo Lady rallied from last place to upset Gamely by a half-length. went to Steve Savage of Oregon in 8:45.0, third to Tom Donnelly of Villanova in 8:45.5, and fourth to Sid Sink of Bowling Green in 8:48.2. Pettigrew, after his blistering opening pace, hung on to defeat Kerry Pearce, the defending NCAA champ, who clocked 8:53.9.


