Paris Flea Market Aids Fellowships

"Fete des Fleurs" bearing all the similarities of a Paris flea market is the unusual and entertaining event planned for this area by the Palos Verdes-Rolling Hills Branch of the American Association of University Women.

The festival will be held Saturday, March 22, from 1 to 4 p.m. in the cafetorium of Marymount College at Palos Verdes. The sisters and students of Marymount are lending their assistance and cooperation in this affair as their donation to the AAUW Fellowships program, which grant national and international stipends for advance study to women on Ph.D. level, ranging from \$3,000 to \$5,000 per year.

The admission ticket entitles the guest to delicious French pastries and beverage served in the French cafe by "French" waitresses. Various booths and stalls line the Parisian street, gourmet delicacies offered by AAUW Gourmet group; Boutique items from the Creative Stitchery group; a book stall, Flea Market style, contains objets d'art, imported items, and handmade flowers everywhere as decoration and for advanced study to women on Ph.D. level, ranging

There will be an art exhibit of work by members and also exhibits by students and sisters of Marymount. Some will be offered for sale. Toulouse-Lautrec posters, flower carts, and the Eiffel Tower will also be seen.

One painting donated by a Watts artist will be offered for the benefit of the Coretta Scott King Education Fund Campaign, which seeks to raise \$150,000 by June this year for the benefit of education of minority women.

The Fellowships Fund is an 81-year-old institution which grants financial awards to women for writing of doctoral dissertations or for post-doctoral research because this is the stage at which it is most difficult for women to find assistance from other sources. For the 1968-69 academic year, over 80 fellowships totalling over \$350,000 were made available to women.

The Torrance AAUW Branch, in its charter year activity, according to Mrs. Richard Odgers, president, "has dedicated itself to the Fellowships Fund as one of the most important ways to promote the purpose of AAUW . . . to enable gifted women to use their intellectual powers for the good of humanity." The fashion show is the second major event of the new branch for the benefit of the fund.

Mayor Isen has issued an official proclamation in honor of this day, paying tribute to the global vocational education and training program of ORT, as will civic officials from coast to coast.

Local ORT Day will include a production called "ORT's Possible Dream," to be presented at the Palos Verdes Library on Wednesday, March 19, at 7:30 p.m. by South Bay and Palos Verdes Chapters of Women's American ORT. The skit will be directed by Mrs. Louis Silberman and the leading roles will be performed by Mmes. Leonard Glatt, Douglas Brill, Jack Fernandez, Milton Birnbaum, and Albert Optican.

"ORT's Possible Dream" will tell the story of ORT (Or-

ganization for Rehabilitation through Training) with its 600 installations in 22 lands. With a current world-wide enrollment of 50,000, the organization has trained more than a million needy and impoverished people since it started in 1880.

ORT's philosophy is dedicated to the proposition that all men are entitled to learn a skill making them economically independent and leading to a life without charity. Those in Women's American ORT are engaged in a great challenge to determine whether they can provide vocational training for all those in need of an education so dedicated to the modern skills to promote a long enduring peace throughout the world.
