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Youth Authority Predicts Decline in Incarcerations

SACRAMENTO — The California Youth Authority's Division of Research has predicted that commitments, which have been on the decline since 1965, will level off during the 1970s with a low of 4,550 expected during the 1969-70 fiscal year.

The all-time high of 6,061 was recorded in 1964-65.

The report states that the total is expected to begin a climb back up to 4,986 by 1974-75 and then level off at 4,951 in 1978-79.

Returns of parole violators to

CYA institutions will remain fairly constant, ranging from 3,695 in 1969-70 to 3,632 in 1978-79.

The report is based, in part, on projections that the post-war increase in the juvenile and teen-age population will taper off during the 1970's.

California's population of 10- to 20-year-olds, estimated at 2.7 million in 1960-61, increased to 4 million in the current fiscal year, but by 1978-79 is expected to grow only to 4.45 million.

Seek Permanent Status For Cabinet Committee

Congressman Glenn M. Anderson (D-17th District) has joined 22 colleagues in co-sponsoring a bill to establish the Interagency Committee on Mexican-American Affairs as a permanent agency of the government.

"Spanish surnamed Ameri-

cans must be brought into the mainstream of our society, sharing in the economic, social, and educational benefits," Anderson said. "For too long now they have been denied their fair share of the action."

The bill, he said, would make

the committee a permanent agency of the government seeking to identify the needs of the nation's second largest minority group.

The committee was created in 1967 as a cabinet committee. Its members are the secretaries of

health, education, and welfare; commerce, labor, housing and urban development, agriculture, the director of the Office of Economic Opportunity, and the commissioner of Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.

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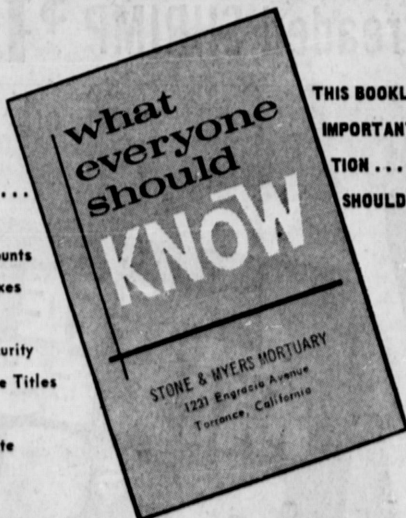
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
