Canada Film Fest Comes to Torrance

● **Alphabet** — 11 min. black and white, McGraw-Hill; An art film on the letters of the alphabet suitable for ages 6 to 60.

● **Alberta Fishing Is Fun** — 14 min. color, National Film Board of Canada; Here in the Alberta Rockies, with such magic names as Banff and Jasper National Parks to serve as lure, the visitor is soon under the spell not only of the fishing but of the bountiful scenery and fresh air that goes with it. But with all this the film is still a fishing story, and the fine angling by young and old fishermen is the kind that many will wish to emulate.

● **Atlantic Salmon in Newfoundland** — 13 min. color, National Film Board of Canada; Filmed in the remote serenity of one of Newfoundland's many salmon rivers, this film gives a fair sampling of the thrilling sport. Lee Wulff demonstrates his techniques, the same as those described in his book on salmon fishing, considered by many sportsmen to be the fisherman's Bible.

● **Breath of Spring** — 23 min. color, National Film Board of

Canada; This cine-poem filmed in British Columbia, captures, as nearly as a camera can, the new surge of life that pervades all of nature in small ways and grand during this very special season.

● **Canada's Waterways West** — 28 min. color, National Film Board of Canada; In this film you explore Canada's lakes and rivers from the Atlantic to the Pacific, from the "most photographed, most painted" Peggy's Cove on Nova Scotia's shore, to the mountain fringed straits beyond Vancouver's harbor.

● **Edmonton, Canada's Holiday City** — 16 min. color, National Film Board of Canada; There are hundreds of ways of looking at this mushrooming city of northern Alberta and this film shows most of them — night life and working life, winter and summer, sports, history, oil.

● **Free from Care** — 13 min. color, National Film Board of Canada; Brook trout and silver salmon inshore, fighting tuna on the open sea, a duck or pheasant shoot, or a big game hunt — sport of every kind is in this film for the outdoorsman.

● **Marine Highways** — 13 min. color, National Film Board of Canada; No matter what the weather, sailors find compensation enough just being there, experiencing for themselves the drama of sea and mountain — an experience that all viewers of this film will

equally enjoy. Along the way they get first-hand impressions of the province's mammoth lumber industry. On shore they see tall totem poles, relics of a vanishing Indian culture and, in protected inlet, the new city of Kitimat, grown out of a gigantic hydro-aluminum development.

● **Place to Be** — 13 min. color, National Film Board of Canada; This film captures the best of Vancouver with camerawork that gives every scene a special beauty and distinction from the top of Grouse Mountain to the seashore and the city's edge.

● **Royal Province** — 20 min. color, National Film Board of Canada; The kind of film that, by painting in the background of the past, quickens the traveler's interest in things observed at every turn of the road. Though an ocean away from the ancient stones of the old World, the historic ruins and relics seen in this film have a direct line with history overseas.

● **Ski** — 14 min. color, National Film Board of Canada; This film shows that you don't have to be an expert to have fun in the snow. On the pine-studded slopes of the Laurentians, on the sky-high flanks of the Rockies — from coast to coast, wherever there is snow, skiing is great in Canada.

Review of JOBS Plan On Agenda

The National Alliance of Businessmen for the Long Beach/South Bay area will review the local progress of the JOBS program (Job Opportunities in the Business Sector) over the past year and discuss JOBS goals for the year to come at a meeting of all area employers Friday.

The meeting will be held at the Torrance Recreation Center, 3341 Torrance Blvd., from 9 to 11 a.m.

According to Dr. Richard D. DeLauer, vice president and general manager of TRW's Systems Group and chairman of the Alliance in the Long Beach area, nearly 2,000 disadvantaged persons have been placed in pro-

ductive positions in the area since the JOBS program got underway a year ago.

Dr. DeLauer will also announce the Alliance's local goals for the year to come at the

meeting. The new goal is expected to involve the placement of at least 3,000 more disadvantaged persons in jobs in the Long Beach/south Bay area by June of 1970.

In a parallel effort, the Alliance is attempting to find more than 1,000 summer jobs for disadvantaged young people locally.

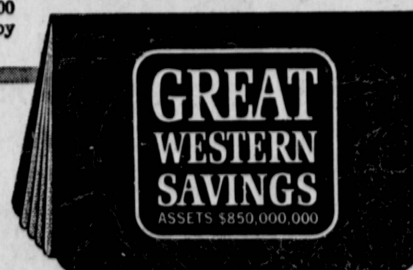
