

# Eastern Orthodox Mark Resurrection

The 200 million Eastern Orthodox throughout the world will celebrate Easter this Sunday, while the rest of Christendom celebrated Christ's Resurrection on April 6.

The Eastern Orthodox Church conforms to a decision of the Council of Nicea in 325 A.D. in determining the date of Easter. The council decreed that three requirements must be fulfilled: Resurrection day, Easter, should be celebrated on (1) the Sunday immediately following (2) the first full moon occurring after the vernal equinox, i.e., the first day of spring, but always after (3) the Hebrew Passover, in order that consistency with Biblical sequence of events is maintained.

The Eastern Orthodox faithful of the South Bay, Centinela, and Harbor areas will commemorate Holy Week and Easter at the St. Katherine Greek Orthodox Church, 722 Knob Hill, Redondo Beach.

On Holy Wednesday evening, the Sacrament of Holy Unction was performed and administered to the faithful for the remedy of illness and absolution of sin.

On Holy Thursday morning, St. Basil's Divine Liturgy was conducted. On Holy Thursday evening the entire story of Christ's Passion was told in the reading of 12 selected Gospel Lessons and was climaxed in a solemn procession of the Cross of Christ throughout the Church.

GOOD FRIDAY morning, today, the Passion Hours were read.

Then at 7:30 p.m. tonight, The Lamentations service commemorates not only His Burial, but His Descent into Hades to bring His Kingdom to the deceased and to abolish the power of Satan.

The Tomb of Christ is placed in the area before the Altar and is covered with a profusion of flowers. A cloth representing the Body of Christ is inside the Tomb at the beginning of the service and is then carried around in a procession.

## Jehovah's Witness Assembly

On Saturday morning the St. Basil Divine Liturgy will be celebrated at 9:30 a.m. The Resurrection Service is a midnight candlelight service that commences with a prayer service at 11 p.m. Saturday night. Then at midnight, all the lights in the church are extinguished and the hymn, "Behold the dawn and rise of day," is chanted in total darkness. This matins troparion or hymn speaks of the myrrh-bearing women who first discovered the empty tomb early that first Easter morn.

AFTER THIS hymn, the Royal Gates of the altar screen are opened and the priest comes forth with lighted candles in hand, chanting: "Come ye, take the light from the Light that never wanes. Come glorify the Christ risen from the dead."

"The light is distributed to everyone in the congregation, all of whom are holding candles in anticipation that Christ's Resurrection will come to them personally. Then the hymns of Easter are chanted in a church lighted by the Light of Christ. The main and triumphant hymn of Easter, Christos Anesti or Christ is Risen is chanted many times during the Resurrection service:

Christ is risen from the dead  
Trampling down death by death  
And to those in the tomb bestowing life.

The Divine Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom follows the Resurrection service, and after the Liturgy the eloquent Eas-

## Dr. Orr To Give Series

Dr. J. Edwin Orr, author and world traveler, will direct the Spring Bible Conference at Torrance First Baptist Church, 2118 Carson St., April 13 through 20.

The sessions will begin Sunday at 8:15 and 11 a.m., and 7 p.m., and continue Monday through Friday at 7:30 p.m. On the following Sunday, sessions will again be held at 8:15 and 11 a.m., and at 7 p.m.

Dr. Orr, who was ordained to the Baptist ministry in 1940, is currently chaplain emeritus of the Hollywood Christian Group, which he helped to found.

The guest speaker is the author of a score of books, some popular and some scholarly, which have been translated into 12 languages.

A native of Ireland, Dr. Orr received his secular education at the City of Belfast College of Technology; at Northwestern University; and at Oxford University, where he earned his second doctorate.

Dr. Orr is said to have "more degrees than a clinical thermometer," having received his theological training at North Baptist Theological Seminary, with post-graduate studies in Episcopal, Brethren, Jesuit, Lutheran, Methodist, and Presbyterian graduate schools.

On Eastern Sunday evening, at 7 p.m., the AGAPE Service is chanted. It is a vesper consisting of Easter hymns and the Gospel lesson of St. John telling of Christ's Resurrection and the events of the first Easter Sunday.

The Gospel lesson also tells of the institution by Christ of the Sacrament of Penance and tells of the doubts of Thomas. As a manifestation that Christ's teaching has spread over the earth, the Gospel will be read in several languages.

## 'Green Power' Chief To Speak at Temple

Howard Stevenson, executive vice president of Green Tower Foundation, Inc. in Los Angeles, which employs about 100 members of the Black community in South-Central Los Angeles, will be the featured speaker next Friday at Temple Menorah, 1101 Camino Real, Redondo Beach. The talk will follow services which

begin at 8 p.m., it was announced by Charles Elkind, chairman of the Social Action Committee. The community is invited. It is free of charge.

Stevenson, formerly a successful aerospace engineer, along with several other dedicated and motivated black men, left industry in order to help their people help themselves.

He will talk about the work being done by the Foundation which came into existence two years ago, following the riots of Watts, and which now provides meaningful employment to Negroes.

Stevenson, a native of Chicago, was graduated from USC in 1952 with a degree in engineering. He worked for 17 years in the field of engineering prior to joining Green Power, a non-profit corporation whose products include baseball bats, children's picnic tables and chess boxes.

Members of the Torrance Seventh-day Adventist church will focus on higher education Saturday as they hear progress reports on world health programs sponsored by Loma Linda University, the denomination's West Coast university.

According to Pastor David H. Pillor, the university, which for 64 years has educated Christian youth in the health professions, is placing new emphasis on public health programs for primitive and developing nations.

"It isn't enough to provide clinical and hospital care for the sick and ailing," the pastor said. "We've got to place more emphasis on health education and disease prevention—and that's what is happening at Loma Linda University these days."

Pastor Pillor said that the university's School of Medicine was, for about 60 years, the largest west of the Mississippi River and that its 4,000 living graduates are serving throughout the world.

"The university, with its schools of dentistry, nursing, public health, and health-related professions is the educational hub of a 300-institution world health complex operated by Adventists," he observed.

A special offering supporting the church's health mission will be taken at the Sabbath service.
