## New Plan for Selecting Architects Is Approved

County supervisors, by a unanimous vote, have initiated a program which will establish better guidelines for the selection of architects for capital projects.

The proposal was prepared by the County's Citizens Economy and Efficiency Committee, which had the matter under study for many months. More than 70 interviews with architects, administrators of capital project programs, and other experts went into the study.

In a nutshell, the program provides for establishment of a five-member committee of experts to screen and recommend a list of architects for various county construction projects. The final selection will be made, as it is now, by the Board of Supervisors.

THE COMMITTEE believes the creation of a screening board will add new and needed depth to the process of architect selection.

The committee was careful to point out that in the past, the architects appointed by su-

pervisors have performed well. No criticism of the selections was intended, the committee said.

However, the county is becoming more and more committed to major capital projects, and a systematic and uniform selection of architects to design these facilities is needed.

Because of increased population and demands for more county services, it has been necessary to embark on a \$391 million capital projects program for the next six years. This fact alone stresses the need for systematic selection of architects.

ON SMALLER projects, the County Engineer's office handles the design of buildings and other facilities. But it has been proven to be economical to contract with outside architects for design of larger buildings than to have it done by the county.

If the county were to embark on an "in-house" architectural program for major projects, another massive bureaucracy would be the inevitable result and the cost would

far outdistance the cost of using architects from the private sector.

As you probably have noted from my explanation of the program, I favored the recommendations of the Citizens Economy and Efficiency Committee and supported them wholeheartedly with my vote.

I believe they are in the best interests of the taxpayer and will take the selection of architects out of the realm of politics.

## Garden Founder Honored

Preparation of a scroll honoring Mrs. Frances Young of Hermosa Beach for her work with the South Coast Botanic Gardens has been authorized, Supervisor Burton W. Chace said.

On Chace's motion, the Board approved a resolution honoring Mrs. Young. She lives at 1037 Second St., Hermosa Beach.

"Mrs. Young has done an outstanding job as Founding President of the South Coast Botanic Gardens Foundation," Chace said. "She also has served in top fashion on the County Arboretum Commission."

AN INTENSIVE Countywide free immunization program to eradicate the ten-day red measles will be launched by the County Health Department in a two-day campaign April 26 and 27.

The County Health Department warns that even though measles can kill or can cause mental retardation and deafness, there are still approximately 187,000 children, between the ages of one to five, who have not been immunized in Los Angeles County.

Last year there were 154 cases and one child died from measles. This is particularly tragic since the death could have been possibly avoided if the child had been vaccinated.

Immunization centers against measles will be set up for children in the one-to-five-year age bracket in centers throughout all of the County's 23 community health districts.

THE TWO-DAY immunization clinics will be in operation between 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Staffing for the campaign will include County Health Department staff and community

workers. Since today's vaccine is safe and highly effective, it is unfortunate for any parent to deprive a child of complete protection against this communicable disease. There is enough vaccine to eradicate

measles in Los Angeles County.
