Controller Will Speak At College

Political science students at El Camino College will have an opportunity to meet informally with Houston Flournoy, California State Controller, when he comes to the local campus Friday as the guest of political science instructor Jack Cashin.

Flournoy will be honored at a luncheon attended by students and faculty in the cafeteria and then speak at a combined meeting of several political science classes.

Flournoy's background encompasses a wide range of accomplishments. He is a specialist in constitutional and political science, and served as an associate professor of government at Pomona College and Claremont graduate school from 1957-1966.

IN 1950 Flournoy received his bachelor's degree in government from Cornell University. He earned his masters' degree in 1952 and his doctorate in 1956 from Princeton University.

Flournoy has worked as a researcher for the New Jersey Legislature, and served in Washington, D.C., as legislative assistant to U.S. Sen. H. Alexander Smith.

Flournoy serves on 16 boards and commissions dealing with California affairs and was chairman of Governor Reagan's Advisory Commission on Taxation which filed its report last month.

Murder Suspect Arraigned

Murder suspect Dan Saban, 506 Via Los Miradores, was arraigned Tuesday in South Bay Superior Court. He will enter his plea May 1.

Saban is accused of shooting his son-in-law early Jan. 1, while a New Year's party was in progress at the Saban home. The victim, Paul Robert Beulick, 29, was the husband of Saban's 21-year-old daughter Mildred.

Police believe Beulick was shot in or near the Saban home shortly after midnight, then managed to get into his car and drive a short way from the home before losing control of the car.

Beulick died of his wounds a few hours later at Little Company of Mary Hospital. Saban has been free on \$50,000 bail since the shooting. His preliminary hearing was held April 22.




