Governor Unveils Program For Statewide Tax Reform

SACRAMENTO — Governor Ronald Reagan's long awaited tax reform program, aimed at reducing the property tax on citizens while offering in-creased funds for education, lus a voluntary program of in-ome tax withholding, is before

In his "long-range" reform program, the governor stressed that he is also proposing that counties and cities be required to hold the line on property taxes so that they would not "negate the relief provided through this reform proposal."

He declared that his program is entirely separate and in addition to the \$100 million personal income tax rebate

Stressing the fact that of the \$1,350 which each average Californian pays in taxes, \$840 goes to the federal government, the governor said the first part of his program includes a proposal to increase the homeowners property tax exmption from \$750 to \$1,000. The in cr e as e d exemption would cost the state \$102 million, including \$49 million in additional montes for the counties to replace revenues previously lost because of veterans' exemptions.

ALSO PROPOSED would be the use of the veterans' ex-emption funds plus \$26 million in additional revenues realized from removal of various sales tax exemptions, to reduce the husiness inventory tax by an business inventory tax by an

To provide the revenues nec-essary to replace the \$103 mil-lion to finance the balance of the property tax relief mea-sure, the governor proposes to eliminate "unwarranted sales tax exemptions, on containers, repair services and magazines." He charged, "these exemptions tend to make the sales tax less equitable than it

OTHER proposals sought in the 1969 session will include: a return to the use of personal exemptions on the state in-come tax to relieve the burden on large, middle income fami-lies; permission for all county property tax payers to pay on property tax payers to pay on a quarterly basis; and consoli-dation and coordination of the bulk of state tax-collecting

In his second part of the tax reform proposal, Governor Reagan would, as Assem-blyman William T. Bagley (R-San Rafael) put it, "let a crack form in the wall" the governor has held against personal in-come tax withholding.

The governor would offer four options on a "voluntary prepayment plan" for personal income taxes. These included:

THE FIRST two options of-fer the taxpayer a 2 per cent credit on his taxes at the end of the year for participating in the withholding and early pay-ment plan.

The governor, as another part of his second phase tax relief plan, would replace 80 per cent of the residential property tax, now levied by local school districts, by a statewide Educational Opportunity Tax of 1 per cent on adjusted gross personal income. This, he says, personal income. This, he says, plus the increase in the home-owners' exemption, would re-duce the average residential property tax throughout the state by well over 50 per cent.

A statewide educational op-portunity tax would be placed on non-residential property, replacing 80 per cent of the non-residential property taxes now collected by local school districts. That rate would be approximately \$3.50 per \$100 assessed valuation ssed valuation

BOTH THE adjusted gross income and non-residential

property taxes would be depos-tied in an education fund and distributed on an average daily attendance basis. These funds would provide \$1.6 billion, to be added to the \$1.3 billion now

Property tax rates levied by local school boards would be limited to \$1.10 per \$100 as-sessed value and a 60 per cent majority of voters would be required before additional lo-cal taxes could be added. not participate in any form of tax withholding.

The governor also advocated that future tax increases, on the state level, would require a two-thirds vote of the legislature. Presently only bank, cor-poration franchise tax and gross premiums insurance taxes require a two-thirds legislative approval.


