The ocasion will be the Sixth Annual Scholar-Athlete Awards Banquet. Some 600 former football greats, coaches, and football enthusiasts are expected to jam the Grand Ballroom of the Beverly Hilton Hotel for the program. Braven Dyer, one of the best-known sportswriters in th enation, will be the emcee.

Dr. Topping will be presented with an award for citizenship by Chester J. LaRoche, president of the National Foundation and Football Hall of Fame. Previous winners of this award have included Los Angeles District Attorney Evelle Younger and State Superin- Harbor tendent of Education Dr. Max Rafferty.

Schroeder, probably the world's most prolific trophy-giver, will be on the receiving end of the sportsmanship award. This award has previously gone to Dr. Vierling Kersey, educator and civic leader, and Elmer Bromley, attorney and sportsman. Former University of Michigan All-American tackle Al Wiastert will present it.




