Football Scholars

Football comes back into season for one brief evening Friday when the Los Angeles Chapter of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame salutes University of Southern California president Dr. Norman Topping, Helms Athletic Foundation founder-managing director W. R. (Bill) Schroeder, and 12 outstanding high school student-football luminaries.

The occasion will be the Sixth Annual Scholar-Athlete Awards Banquet. Some 600 former football greats, coaches, and football enthusiasts are expected to jam the Grand Ballroom of the Beverly Hilton Hotel for the program. Braven Dyer, one of the best-known sports-writers in the nation, will be the emcee.

Dr. Topping will be presented with an award for citizenship by Chester J. LaRoche, president of the National Foundation and Football Hall of Fame. Previous winners of this award have included Los Angeles District Attorney Evelle Younger and State Superintendent of Education Dr. Max Rafferty.

Schroeder, probably the world's most prolific trophy-giver, will be on the receiving end of the sportsmanship award. This award has previously gone to Dr. Vierling Kersey, educator and civic leader, and Elmer Bromley, attorney and sportsman. Former University of Michigan All-American tackle Al Wiastert will present it.

Graduating seniors from USC and UCLA will also be on hand to help honor the 12 high school standouts, whose football achievements were bright and whose classroom excellence ranges from 3.0 to 3.9 on a grade scale where 4.0 is straight-A.

The newly-selected scholar-athletes from 175 schools in the Los Angeles City and CIF Southern Section will each receive handsome plaques and be introduced by M. F. "Dixie" Howell, all-time great passing quarterback from University of Alabama, and Bill Barnes, former UCLA head coach, the co-chairmen of the selection panel.

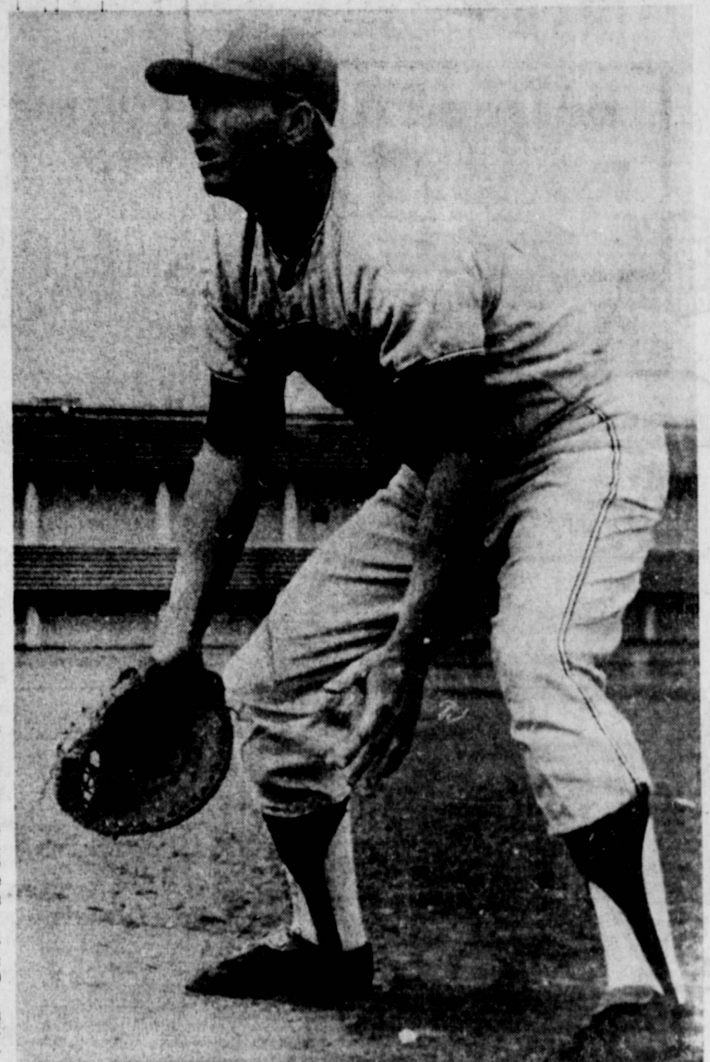

Quarterback Greg Collins and Guard Don Satterlee of Bishop Montgomery High School will play in the game.

The Catholic stars called from recommendations of head coaches in the 36 parochial high schools in Los Angeles, Orange, Ventura, Santa Barbara, and Riverside Counties, will oppose the Los Angeles City team which defeated them 43-20, last year before 17,842 spectators at the Coliseum.
