Rites Set for Former Mayor

Funeral services for J. Hugh Sherfey, 57, former mayor and long time civic leader in Torrance, were scheduled for 3 p.m. today at the Stone and Myers Mortuary Chapel.

The Rev. Hugh R. Percy, rector of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church, will officiate. Mr. Sherfey was a member of the church for many years.

The Masonic Lodge also will officiate at the rites.

MR. SHERFEY died Saturday evening at a Torrance hospital following a brief illness. At the time of his death he was executive vice president and manager of Stone and Myers Mortuary, with which he had been associated for many years.

He was born Oct. 17, 1911, in Colfax, Wash., and came to Torrance in the 1930s. Active in community affairs throughout his life, he was elected to the Torrance City Council in 1946 and served from 1946 until 1950 as mayor.

He was president of the Torrance Rotary Club in 1942 and 1943, served as a member of the Torrance Planning Commission in the 1940s and again in the early 1950s, and was chairman of the Red Cross fund drive in 1954, 1955, and 1956.

MR. SHERFEY also was chairman of the Salvation Army Salvage campaign here for many years. He helped organize and was a founding member of the Torrance Mounted Police. Mr. Sherfey served as the first secretary-treasurer of the El Toga Shrine Club.

Active in Boy Scout work, he served as chairman of the local district finance committee of Riverside County in 1966-67 when he lived in Palm Springs.

The Torrance Mounted Police rodeo, held annually in August, will be dedicated to Mr. Sherfey's memory this year, according to Police Lt. Carmel Cook.

Surviving Mr. Sherfey are his widow, Jessie D. Sherfey of Torrance; two sons, John Hugh III of Carpinteria and Charles G. of Torrance; his mother, Mrs. Theo M. Sherfey of Missouri; a sister, Mrs. Geraldine Bartholomew, also of Missouri; and two grandchildren.


Inurnment will be in Westwood Murray Cemetery, Palm Springs.

Oil Well 'Midges' Owners Breeding In Swamp

Oil well operators are complaining that recent safety and beautification standards passed by the Torrance City Council are too stringent.

Councilmen were presented with a telegram from Pete Lacombe last night, which stated that the oil code "creates a hardship for your staff and my clients (Chanslor Western and others)." Lacombe requested that the council visit his clients oil well sites and reconsider their safety. He also asked for more time to comply with requirements.

Councilman Ken Miller lambasted oil well operators for claiming hardship after they had already met with homeowners and agreed to terms of the oil well ordinance. "Are we going to renegotiate the negotiations we already negotiated?" Miller asked.

Councilman William J. Urekwitz said that oil men could apply for a variance if they found oil codes too restrictive. He added that it is more important than ever to have safety rules enforced because warmer weather will mean more children playing outdoors.

Councilmen noted that the threat of a "barrel tax" had not encouraged voluntary compliance with the oil ordinance, especially among the small producers. Councilman Ross Sciarrotta suggested a type of tax which would impose a high levy on the first barrel produced, working down to a much smaller levy on the 50th or 100th barrel.

Building Director John McKinnon told councilmen that his men are currently in the field, issuing citations. Some sites yield as many as 35 violations, he noted.

There is no mosquito problem in "Madrona Swamp," City Manager Edward J. Ferraro told city councilmen last night.

Ferraro's remarks were prompted by a letter from a lawyer representing the Torrance Heights Civic Association, stating that the city would be liable if disease resulted from city neglect of the area.

"Madrona Swamp" is bounded on the south by Sepulveda Boulevard, on the west by Madrona Avenue, and on the north by Monterey Street. Residents claim that the "stagnant, bad smelling" water is a breeding ground for mosquitos.

Ferraro said that a check of the area had revealed there was no evidence of mosquitos, but that similar insects known as "midges" were proliferating.

The matter was referred back to city management for further recommendations.

walks for their children if the plan is approved.

Also proposed in the program are:

- Parent information meetings;
- Meetings with administrators affected;
- Staff selection and orientation;
- Formation of curricular offerings and scheduling of classes;
- Student orientation;
- Facility improvements where required (\$8,200);
- Liaison with police department to establish safe routes to and from school for children where needed.

A second pilot program involving Sepulveda and Jefferson schools was also on the agenda, but was likewise postponed.

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
