Southern California's outstanding graduating senior basketball players will clash July 9 when the Second Annual Southern California All-Star Prep Basketball Classic unfolds at the Forum in Inglewood.

The doubleheader, pitting the Los Angeles City against the CIF Southern Section 4-A and the CIF Southern Section 3-A, 2-A and 1-A in a companion clash, has received approval from the National Collegiate Athletic Association and will be sponsored by the Manhattan Beach Lions Club and the Southern California Interscholastic Basketball Coaches Associa-

Last year's inaugural games at the Forum were successful artistically and financially. The L.A. City All-Stars defeated their CIF-SS 4-A (then 3-A) counterparts, 113-108, in a sensational scoring duel before 7,333 thoroughly impressed spectators.

In the preliminary game, a 2-A all-star team overpowered the 1-A, 105-68.

This year, because of the expansion of the CIF Southern Section to four divisions in playoffs competition and in an attempt to even up the second feature, the 3-A, 2-A and 1-A talent will be combined and divided up into an East-West game.

Charles (Chuck) Clustka said, "The L.A. City-CIF Southern Section 4-A game is obviously the feature, but we want to have a very competitive situation in the other game, so this plan has been adopted by the coaches, with the approval of the Lions Club and

Clustka, former UCLA basketball star who went into coaching at Harvard School in North Hollywood and is now an administrator there, will be directing the SCIBA portion of the preparations for this year's

The Los Angeles City team will be selected from schools in the Eastern, Marine, Northern, Southern, Western, East Valley, Mid Valley and West Valley
