Widows Urged to Check Social Security Early

of every three young widows in out that they could collect monthly social security benefits for themselves and their mother, too, while any of the children under 18 are in and a half of work in the three children. the South Bay area did not find children until sometime after their husband's death, Miles Davis, social security district

manager, said today. "Most of them did get to the Torrance social security office before any benefits were lost," Davis said. "But the surprising thing is that so many young wives are not even aware that social security provides protection for the family if the hus band and father dies and this protection is worth as much as \$75,000 to \$100,000 to an individual family. In a number of cases, the funeral director sug-gested that the widow get in touch with the social security office. In others, the visit to the social security office was made in the faint hope, rather than the expectation, that pay-ments could be made to the family.'

SOCIAL security survivors benefits are now in their 30th year, Davis pointed out. Over year. Davis pointed out. Over the years since January, 1940, when the first monthly checks were mailed out, more than \$23½ billion has been paid to young widows and children. About 95 out of 100 mothers and children are protected right now if the family bread-witners should die, he noted. winner should die, he noted.

Every young family, he said, should take account of social security benefits in its financial planning. Every young husband should make sure that his wife knows that social security is not just retirement insurance, but that in case of his death, social security will also provide an income for her and the children until the fami-
