Young attacked Anderson for "misstatement of evidence," pointing out that Anderson could say anything at all about Nollac in the course of his legal presentation without fear of law suit, because of high court rulings.

YOUNG explained the discrepancy between the two invoices by saying that no lending agency lends 100 per cent for this type of work. He said the bill presented to Cabrillo Savings only represented the work to be paid for by the lending company. The actual cost to South Bay Realty, he said, was the cost listed on the invoice presented to the city.

Young said the difference between the estimate and the actual cost was the result of sewer construction plan changes.

Young also stated Nollac had not been found guilty of fraud. He said the charge of "inefficiency" was not that set forth by Ferraro, but was "found guilty of inefficiency in not having cost verification procedures, which is a charge that was not included in the accusation." He said it violated the charter and violated due process of law because a person cannot be found guilty on an offense on which he was not charged.

IN A SECOND charge, Nollac was found guilty of inefficiency and failure to perform duties in a case involving the reimbursement of sewer funds to Jewell Land Co. (C. N. Cake). The Civil Service Commission found that Nollac recommended to the city manager that Jewell Land Co. be

reimbursed \$10,785 for which the company was not eligible.

Anderson said that the "City Council had again been deceived" by the proposition that it was all right to give Cake a \$10,785 for a pumping station that he had agreed to put in for nothing. Furthermore, Anderson said, the city had only "Cakes" word about his expenses. "We're not sure his total cost was \$26,000," Anderson said, "It could have been \$10,000 for all we know."

Young countered by saying that Cake never agreed to do the work for free, but merely at no cost to the city of Torrance. The subdivider placed the pump in a public street where it served adjoining land as well as Cake property. "The subdivider," Young said, "is reimbursed by the other property owners benefited through prorating the costs by creation of a sewer reimbursement district."

Councilmen will meet Tuesday at 6 p.m. for a personnel session on the Nollac case. The decision will be announced during the regular council meeting, which will begin at 7:30 p.m.
