

'Good Neighbor' Program Launched

A person-to-person campaign to build the old-fashioned trait of neighborliness will be recommended to members of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, 1610 Acacia Ave., this Saturday at 11 a.m.

"The object of this campaign," Pastor David H. Pillor said, "is to enable our members to be of greater help to the community. We expect to find among our 'unknown neighbors' those who are sick,

lonely or discouraged, and thus can give help where our assistance would be appreciated.

"CALLERS FROM the Adventist Church will not be pressing into their neighbors' affairs," Pastor Pillor continued, "but will be calling to offer help and also an opportunity to study the Bible if there is a desire. Most people know little about the Bible, but would like to at least have an understanding of the book which has affected the world more than any other set of writings," the pastor said.

"In a time when billions of pages of literature — many of them morally debasing — are flooding our homes, it is important that all concerned citizens become better acquainted with the ageless wisdom of the Holy Scriptures," Pastor Pillor said. A simple, easy-to-use Bible course will be offered during the visit to help toward this goal.

THE BIBLE course is being made available by the international radio program, "The Voice of Prophecy" (or television program, "Faith for Today"). Millions of these lessons have been studied with interest by persons in all parts of the world. These students have included the uneducated as well as university professors, ministers, and church leaders of many denominations.

A bright green wagon drawn by a spirited team of Belgian draft horses down Main Street on Monday morning, June 2, may temporarily tie up traffic around Los Angeles City Hall, but not for long. The LAPD has been duly notified and is prepared to handle it as a courtesy to the Union Rescue Mission.

What is the occasion? The Mission is celebrating its 78th birthday by putting the old Gospel Wagon back into operation as it commemorates the early beginnings of its compassionate ministry to the needy and derelicts of the community. Aboard the wagon will be the Old Fashioned Quartet dressed in Gay 90's costume, plus Mission officials and their guest of honor, Councilman Gilbert Lindsey.

Arriving at the entrance of the Mission at 226 S. Main St., Councilman Lindsey and the officials will participate in a ribbon-cutting ceremony

which initiates the beginning of Open House week, June 2 through 8, at the Mission facilities. All friends and neighbors of the Southland are invited to join in the celebration by visiting the Mission and by attending a special Mass Meeting in the Mission Chapel on Sunday, June 8, at 2:30 p.m.

The Sound Generation from the John Brown University will be featured on the program which will be climaxed by an inspirational word from The Reverend H. S. Vigevano, local Presbyterian minister.
