financing of the city Hall addition and the acquisition and development of Columbia Park.

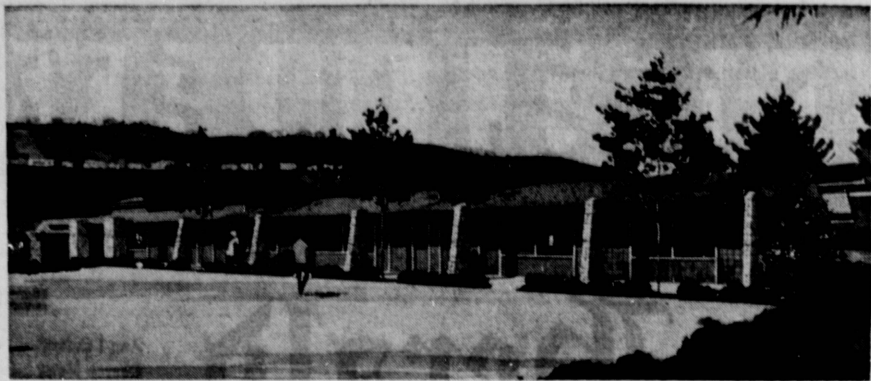
PROPERTY TAXES will account for 34 per cent (\$5,091,911) of total revenues. Other taxes (including the new utility tax) will account for 42 per cent (\$6,140,000) of total revenues.

Ferraro's proposed budget allows for the addition of five new police personnel, with total police expenditure estimated at \$3,068,527. Twelve new police department positions were added in fiscal 1968-69; 18 in 1967-68; 7 in 1966-67; and 16 in 1965-66.

One new position is recommended for the Torrance Fire Department. Total department budget was estimated at \$2,071,854.

In addition to municipal work, Cole has been active in many community efforts. He is an honorary life member of the PTA, an honorary member of the Lomita Jaycees, and of the Lomita-Harbor City Civitan Club.

He served as an advisor for Post for one year.

As a deputy to Supervisor Chace, Cole's responsibilities will include press and community relations.

Crackdown On Drunks Reported

A crackdown on drunk driving in California was made during the first quarter of this year.

Arrests for the serious offense totaled 14,212, according to the National Automobile Club, a rise of 28 per cent over those recorded in the same period last year. And March alone saw 5,000 arrests.

It primarily took an increase of 10 per cent in man-hours of law enforcement to do it, to help rid our public streets of the drunk driving menace.
