He had suffered a massive hemorrhage during abdominal surgery, and had already re-ceived 22 pints of blood. But, the medical center had exhausted its supply of his rare type of blood, and no more was readily available.

8:23 A.M. — Dr. Robert Yonemoto made the first in-cision and the surgery began. 9:30 a.m. — Lara suddenly began to hemorrhage, and blood transfusions started. Due

to frequent previous trans-fusions during his life, he had developed a sensitivity to common types of blood. His type A-positive. Most A-positives have an E-positive sub-type. But Lara couldn't accept E-positive, and had to be given E-negative. Furthermore, it was imperative he be given only fresh blood.




