Artists Set for Sixth International Season

S. Hurok has announced his sixth gala International Season for 1969-70 in The Music Center's Pavilion and one event, the Moiseyev Dance Co., scheduled for Shrine Auditorium.

Only season tickets are now available at the center for the two-series season of eight events each. Three major international dance companies join with an array of world concert artists to form the only such concert season to play The Music Center during this period.

The following artists and companies, unless specified only for either Series A or B, are scheduled on both series on the dates indicated:

● The Stuttgart Ballet of Germany opens the season Nov. 3 and 4 following its much-discussed American premiere this summer in New York's Metropolitan Opera House. Under the direction of choreographer John Cranko, the company will make its first tour of the United States.

● Maestro Hiroyuki Iwaki returns to The Music Center podium to conduct the N H K Symphony of the Japan Broadcasting Corp., Dec. 5, Series A, only.

● Irina Arkhipova, one of the leading mezzo-sopranos of the Bolshoi Opera, makes a recital appearance on Series B, only, Nov. 15. The diva made

her debut Music Center concert appearance when she opened Hurok's 1966 season.

● Next is the American Ballet Theatre Jan. 21 (Series B) and Jan. 25 (Series A). Repertoire for the Los Angeles engagement will include full-length productions of "Swan Lake," "Giselle" and the new "Coppelia," as well as shorter works.

● The Vienna Choir Boys will be heard on Series A, only, Feb. 7. This tour marks the 25th year in America for Austria's prime vocal youngsters under Hurok's management.

● Antal Dorati, music director of the Stockholm Philharmonic, will bring his Scandinavian orchestra in its first visit to the West Coast on Series B, only, March 16. The Swedish symphonic group made its American debut earlier this year.

● Pianist Sviatoslav Richter will make one of his infrequent West Coast appearances in recitals on Feb. 26 (B) and March 1 (A). This supreme artist will be followed by another, violinist David Oistrakh, in recitals March 7 and 8.

● Guitarist Andres Segovia concludes the Pavilion portion of the season March 20 and 22. Dates will be announced for the flamboyant Moiseyev Dance Co. on both series in Shrine Auditorium.

Middle-aged dogs benefit from yearly physical checkups, just as do middle-aged people, and I might add for the same reasons. Annual examinations are excellent preventive medicine. They enable ailments, or tendencies toward disorders, to receive an early diagnosis and treatment.

Such care may save dogs from illness or even add years to their precious lives.

Dogs can be considered middle-aged when they're five years old. Dogs progress from infancy to young adulthood in the first 12 months of life. From then on each year of a dog's life equals about seven years of human life. A dog of five is the equivalent of a human of 45.

MIDDLE-aged dogs, like their human counterparts, may begin to have dental problems, predisposition to kidney and heart conditions, and arthritis. These and other signs of less efficient functioning of body organs can be controlled and prevented from becoming serious if detected in time.

Dog owners can help veterinarians by being extra observant of their canine charges. Changes in eating, drinking, and elimination should be noted, as should unusual discharges or foul odors from any part of your dog's body. Scratching, stiffness, sensitivity, lumps under or on the skin, may indicate possible areas of trouble and should be reported to the veterinarian.

Veterinarian care can be greatly facilitated if the dog is used to being handled in the same manner he'd be treated during an examination.

THE DOG should be accustomed to a table, easily done by using one for grooming. Make certain, however, that the table is sturdy and has a non-slippery covering. Each time the dog is groomed, handle his ears and paws. Pull back his lips and open his mouth to inspect his teeth. Routine nail clipping, ear and teeth cleaning are more readily accomplished with this training and the vet can conduct physical checkups with a more cooperative patient. And that's for dog-gone sure!

But perhaps the dog owner's best help is keeping his bow-wow in good condition with balanced food, good grooming and lots and lots of love.

ITS PATSY time again! The 19th annual Patsy awards will be presented Saturday afternoon, June 14, at Universal Studios in North Hollywood. The Patsy awards for animal actors are the equivalent of the Academy and Emmy Awards for their human thespian counterparts.

Winners will be selected from some 20,000 animals which appeared in AHA (American Humane Association) supervised productions during 1968. All of the nominees had "starring" roles in feature films, first run television productions or filmed TV commercials. This year's nominees include 11 dogs among other species of animal actors.

The Patsy awards honor animal owners and trainers, producers, directors and studios for meeting high humane standards in the presentation of all animals for motion pictures and television.

A tremendously popular and eye-catching performance at many fairs, horse shows and carnivals is the fantastic demonstrations of sheep herding by one or more Border Collies. These demonstrations are nothing short of awe-striking and without doubt, the little black and white dogs are uncanny in their human-like ability to keep a herd of sheep in regimental formation. Amazing but true!

The intelligent Border Collie is well deserving of the widespread praise for his unique and unfailing job as a sheep herder.

He is the descendant of many generations of dogs which have been most carefully bred for the characteristics which make excellent sheepdogs—alertness, obedience, stamina and the natural ability to herd livestock.

THE BORDER Collie is not, unfortunately, AKC registrable. He is, however, registered with the North American Sheep Dog Society of Wooster, Ohio.

Annual sheepdog trials are sponsored by the Society, wherein the dogs compete for honors by demonstrating their ability to herd a flock over a complicated course within a stipulated time limit. Though he is a specialist on sheep, the Border Collie is also a master in handling horses, cattle, hogs, and surprisingly enough, even poultry.

The Border Collie tips the scales at about 45 pounds and in height 20 inches. That's 30 barks for now. Be cumbering you next week.

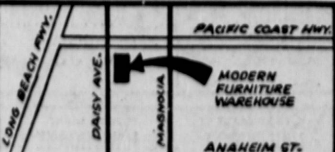
